Supporting the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Chauffard, Haiti, Father Raymond, Parish Priest

Leading the Faithful in Chauffard

Since 2013, Father Louise Marie Raymond has been the priest of the Church of the Immaculate Conception in Chauffard. Father Raymond was born in L'Arcahaie, north-west of Port-au-Prince, along the coast. Coming from a family of nine children, he was the third. Though Father Raymond's father died in 2012, his mother is still living.

He was ordained a priest on December 27, 2009 at the grand cathedral of Port-au-Prince. The cathedral was destroyed during the terrible earthquake of January 12, 2010. He served as vicar (his training year) in the parish of Saint Croix de Fonds-Verrettes and in the parish of Notre Dame du Rosaire in the Croix-des-Bouquets. This was east of Port-au-Prince along a main road.

In Father Raymond's own words, "Since July 2013, I have been sent to and work with the parishioners of Chauffard. This year gives me 46 years of life on earth. I thank the Lord for all he has done for me." Father Raymond is tasked with leading masses and church events not only at Immaculate Conception,

but at chapels in five nearby villages. He also oversees the running of the five schools and coordinates the school lunch program, even ordering and picking up the food stores in the community's only vehicle. The medical clinic in Chauffard is also his responsibility.



Father Destine

Last year, Father Destine was working in Chauffard for his training year, helping Father Raymond. Now that he is ordained, Father Destine is leaving for another parish. Happily, abbe Savio, has now arrived in Chauffard to serve as the trainee of the parish under Father Raymond. Abbe Savio was born in Duval, in the heights of Port-au-Prince. Just like Father Raymond and Father Destine, he is the son of peasants, not from a wealthy family. His mother and father are both still living. They brought into the world six children, abbe Savio being the 5th. After his secondary studies, the abbe entered the Grande Seminaire Notre Dame d'Haiti, where he studied philosophy for two years and theology for four years. Father Raymond wrote that, "He succeeded with great success. Given his competence and his know-how, he was appointed to Chauffard for his internship before being ordained deacon and priest for the mission of the Church. Today, he is 31 years old. He has started well here with the faithful. He adapts well with the community."
