New School Kitchen Completed!

The kitchen for the Chauffard school has long needed an overhaul. The cooks have prepared meals in big pots over fire on the ground for years. They had to bend over as they cooked the meal and lift the heavy pots off the ground. The small room was always smoky and the walls were blacked by soot.

Father Raymond had put together a proposal for improvement and, last winter, we received a \$2,000 donation for the project. The plan was to enlarge the structure and improve ventilation. For the cooking area, gas cylinders would be purchased and two metal frameworks be constructed to create two cooktop areas of three places each allowing the women to prepare the meals over a gas fire while standing at a comfortable level.

Over the summer holidays, the kitchen was enlarged and repainted and the other supplies were purchased. The six bags of cement cost \$43 and the sand \$11 to build walls. Repainting cost \$132 for the paint and \$44 for the labor. \$549 was the cost to purchase and fill the 2 new 100 liter gas tanks. All the metal tubing and connections and framing for the cooking stations came out as \$769. We can imagine how much this improves the quality of life for the lunch cooks!

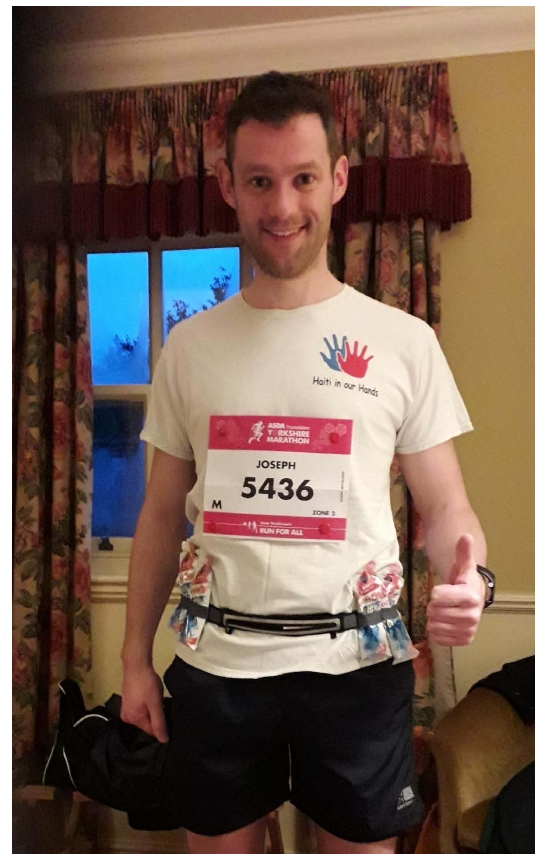

\$1,500 US for car repairs to the only parish vehicle

But we still need money for:

\$165 for one new battery for the parish solar panels (24 batteries needed)

The current batteries are over five years old and don't work. The entire solar set up is 15 years old. Solar power is used for lighting in the school, clinic and parish offices/rectory, and electricity in the same buildings so Father Raymond and the teachers can charge their computers and phones, and to power the refrigerator.

\$2,400 US to repair the generator OR

\$9,500 US to purchase a new one

The buildings use a generator for electricity when the solar power runs out.
